Alberta	<p>Alberta Health Services has an online self-assessment tool that you can use to determine if you have symptoms of Covid-19. Testing is currently focused on individuals who have developed symptoms within 14 days of returning from travel outside of Canada or who have been in contact with someone diagnosed with the illness. If the results suggest you should do so, call your healthcare provider or the health line at 811. Alberta has also launched a mobile app that connects patients with doctors for video appointments.</p> <p>There are two drive-thru testing centers now open in Calgary and Edmonton, but these require a referral from Health Link.</p>	https://www.albertahealthservices.ca/topics/Page16997.aspx
British Columbia	<p>If you have symptoms, the first step is to use the BC Center for Disease Control online assessment tool. If the results suggest you should do so, call your healthcare provider or the health line at 811. Manitoba	<p>Manitoba has an online self-assessment tool as well as a telephonic 1-877-308-9038 self-assessment using interactive voice response format. The province has opened 11 dedicated testing sites, five in Winnipeg, and one each in Brandon, Selkirk, Thompson, Flin Flon, Steinbach, and The Pas.</p>	https://www.gov.mb.ca/covid19/index.html
New Brunswick	<p>The province has set up 12 new Covid-19 assessment centers. Testing is only available by referral to those exhibiting mild to moderate symptoms who follow a triage completed by Tele-Care 811. Newfoundland and Labrador	<p>Mobile test centers have been opened with Western and Eastern Health. The centers will be open 7 days a week and nurses will be collecting samples from individuals while they remain in their vehicle. Those who have returned from travelling and develop symptoms are asked to call Health Line 811 or use the online self-assessment tool prior to visiting one of the mobile test centers.</p>	https://www.gov.nl.ca/covid-19/

Northwest Territories	Northwest Territories confirmed its first case of Covid-19 as of March 20 and has shut its borders to people coming in from outside of the territory. The province has increased physician phone appointments to make space at healthcare facilities for those who need to be assessed by phone.	https://www.hss.gov.nt.ca/en/services/coronavirus-disease-covid-19
Nova Scotia	Nova Scotia is asking anyone who arrives in the province from outside Nova Scotia or the country to self-isolate for 14 days. People should only call the 811 line if they are showing symptoms and if they have fill out the self-assessment questionnaire. Covid-19 testing sites have been set up in 13 locations.	https://novascotia.ca/coronavirus/
Nunavut	Nunavut asks anyone arriving in the territory from elsewhere in the country or internationally to self-isolate for 14 days. If you develop symptoms after travelling to a region with known cases of Covid-19, or after being in close contact with someone who has, you should stay home and advise your healthcare professional or public health authority of your potential exposure before coming in.	https://www.gov.nu.ca/health/information/covid-19-novel-coronavirus
Ontario	<p>The Ministry of Health asks people complete the self-assessment questionnaire before contacting Telehealth Ontario at 1-866-797-0000 or calling their primary care physician or visit a COVID-19 assessment centre.</p> <p>The wait to get test results is currently between 5-7 days, though associate medical officer of health Dr. Barbara Yaffe said Public Health Ontario's laboratory has expanded, allowing for up to 5,000 tests per day to be conducted. The wait time for testing is much longer for people in remote areas because of how long it takes to get a specimen to a testing center, as the tests are either being sent to Toronto or Ottawa.</p>	https://www.ontario.ca/page/2019-novel-coronavirus
Prince Edward Island	PEI has launched an online self-assessment tool for Covid-19. The province asks that you only call 811 if you have returned from travel outside of Canada in the past 14 days, have a fever greater than 38 degrees Celsius and/or a cough, or if you've been in close contact with a person with a laboratory confirmed case of Covid-19.	https://www.princeedwardisland.ca/en/topic/covid-19

Quebec	Quebec has set up a new information line for people who have symptoms of Covid-19 and asks that people call 1-877-644-4545 instead of 811. If you have returned from travelling and are experiencing a cold and fever, the province asks you to call that number to set up an appointment for an assessment at one of the 15 Covid-19 screening centers. Montreal has a drive-thru and a walk-up testing site that can be visited following a referral from the information line or if you are experiencing symptoms and have travelled or been in contact with a confirmed case of Covid-19.	https://www.quebec.ca/en/health/health-issues/a-z/2019-coronavirus/
Saskatchewan	The province launched an online assessment tool to help people determine if they need medical attention and testing. Saskatchewan Health Authority asks that people only call Healthline 811 if the online assessment determines further testing is needed. Dedicated testing facilities have been set up across the province, but they are not open to walk-in patients. Yukon Territories	Yukon currently does not have any confirmed cases of Covid-19. People who have travelled outside of Canada in the last 14 days are advised to self-isolate, including those who have been to Alaska. If you develop symptoms within 14 days of returning to Yukon after travelling and live in Whitehorse, call Yukon Communicable Disease Control at 867-667-8323.
